Tami Ichino (Japan, 1978)

Simple in appearance, serene and well-balanced, Tami Ichino's compositions reveal different facets of the world. They show elements of a hidden world that the artist, with subtlety and clarity, likes to highlight. Taken out of context, her subjects are sublimated by their surreal appearance and a sophisticated technique based on the unique use of the three primary colors. This is how they acquire a metaphorical and spiritual dimension.

Attracted by what one does not see but which exists, Tami Ichino also raises the question of the senses: the subtle dialogues between the colors and the forms are an echo of our interiority.

Aurélie Pétrel (France, 1980)

French artist Aurélie Pétrel revisits the role, status and nature of the image. For her, the photographic work is not a finished object: the same shot can be reused and approached from several angles depending on the context and the choice of the artist. Printed on various media, her images play with the traditional codes of the medium and the notion of photography. Thus, the artist gives a physical presence to her photographic works and invites the viewer to change his viewing perspective. Created in Beirut during a residency initiated by Byblos Bank in 2017, her series *Approche* (2017), born in an urban architectural context, seeks the limits of the possible: the imprintings are so fine that the perception of the materiality of the works is changed, giving more the impression of a drape than of a print on paper.

Aurélie Pétrel was born in Lyon in 1980 and studied at the National School of Fine Arts in Lyon. She lives and works between Paris and Geneva where she is a teacher and head of the Photographic Pool at HEAD since 2012. She is a founding member of the research laboratories «A Broken Arm» and «Échos». 

With her series *Land-Sea* (2007-2018), Marie Velardi combines current climate issues based on scientific research with her fascination with the notion of time. The artist represents coastal areas, such as Thailand, and the effect of expanded time on our civilization, through the specter of the rising waters. Her spatio-temporal representations combine art and science, nature and the human, aesthetics and ethics. Marie Velardi alters the traditional symbol of water in the history of art, turning it into that of "life and survival of the world during a time when water is no longer a common good, a time when 'ecocide' is not considered a crime against humanity" (Jean-Paul Gavard-Perret, *Contemporary Swiss Art*, Section of the Visual and Literary Arts in Switzerland, 14.12.2013).

Marie Velardi was born in 1977 in Geneva, where she lives and works.
